Change of Venue

Some Deacon formation classes will be moving to a new host home—St. John XXIII parish has offered to hold the classes for Candidacy I at the parish one weekend per month. Due to expansion of St. Pius X school, facilities are becoming harder to come by on the campus. That said, the new cohort of Aspirants will meet in the Deacon Office classroom on the second floor of Lourdes Hall.

New Course

The Deacon Formation Curriculum and Policy Board added a new course in philosophy for the first year of Candidacy. While the Aspirants were exposed to a bit of Thomas Aquinas’ philosophy, this will be a more concerted effort in helping them understand the philosophical underpinnings of theology.

New Cohort

A new cohort will be formed this fall with an anticipated ordination in 2030. While over 60 men have inquired about deacon formation, as of this printing, only 8 have submitted applications. The deadline is March 31. Watch for an update in July

Mentors are needed for the growing number of men (and their spouses) in formation. We are looking for deacons and their wives to provide mentoring for up to three couples from your deanery. Training is provided. The time commitment is about two to three hours per month for this very rewarding ministry. You must have at least three years of ordination experience to qualify. Rebuild My Church Update

The *Rebuild My Church Initiative* continues with great collaboration between deans, deanery representatives and parishioners, who are currently articulating draft plans for their deaneries. With continued guidance from the Leadership Roundtable representatives, eight Deanery Teams have conducted listening sessions to surface needs and name priorities, articulate goals and objectives, and develop specific action plans. Draft plans are due to the Archdiocese in April with a projected date for promulgation of a Final Pastoral Plan by Archbishop Wester on October 1.

Next steps in the process include:

The ASF Core Planning team (considered the unofficial ninth deanery) will be busy over the next few months reviewing the submitted deanery drafts as well as writing a mission statement, vision statement and pastoral plan for the Pastoral Center staff. Thanks to Deacon Keith Davis, who recently accepted the invitation to be co-chair with Fr. Glennon Jones.

Deanery Check-ins with the Leadership Roundtable representative, Fr. Kevin Kennedy, will take place at 6:30p, March 25 via Zoom.

A Year For Hope

Archdiocese of Santa Fe Deacons Travel to Rome

Deacons from the Archdiocese of Santa Fe and their wives spent three days in Rome in February 2025, joining 4,000 other “servants” for the 2025 Jubilee of Hope. Our group joined a group of deacons and their wives from San Diego.

Deacons from various countries, including the United States, France, Brazil, India, Cameroon, and Australia, traveled to Rome for the Jubilee pilgrimage.

Holy Doors

The Deacon Group visited six of the seven pilgrim churches in Rome, four of which contained Holy Doors. As the group walked through the Holy Doors at Saint Peter’s Basilica, Father Chris Hallada (Our Lady of Guadalupe) prayed and guided us through the doors to fully understand their significance. Many group members had tears running down their cheeks as we proceeded through the Doors.

On Sunday, 4,000 Deacons participated in the Mass, which also included the ordination of some permanent deacons. Pope Francis did not attend due to his recent illness but was held in prayer throughout the service. Although Pope Francis was not present to lead the service, the experience was overwhelming. What Mass at the Vatican could not be? We were so grateful to be there and to participate in the celebration. *The sea of white Dalmatics was breathtaking, providing a vision and an experience that will not be forgotten.*

Holy Year 2025 Jubilee Logo

The Logo shows four stylized figures representing humanity from all four corners of the earth. They each embrace one another, indicating the solidarity and brotherhood that must unite people. The first figure is clinging to the Cross. The underlying waves are choppy, indicating that the pilgrimage of life is not always on calm waters.

Personal circumstances and world events often call for a greater sense of hope. The lower part of the Cross is elongated, turning into an anchor (a metaphor for hope) that dominates the movement of the waves.

The image shows that the pilgrim's journey is not individual but communal.

Pope Francis Jubilee Quote

“Everyone knows what it is to hope. In the heart of each person, hope dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite not knowing what the future may bring. Even so, uncertainty about the future may at times give rise to conflicting feelings, ranging from confident trust to hesitation and doubt. Often, we come across people who are discouraged, pessimistic, and cynical about the future, as if nothing could possibly bring them happiness. For all of us, may the Jubilee be an opportunity to be renewed in hope.”

Other Sites

In addition to visiting Saint Peter's Basilica, the Deacon Group toured the Vatican Museums, the Basilica of Saint Mary Major (Holy Door), the Basilica of Saint John in Lateran (Holy Door), and the holy stairs while in Rome (Holy Door).

The Deacon group then moved on to Assisi, Siena, and Orvieto. Each area is unique and holds special blessings.

Additional Door

In addition to the four Holy Doors, the Deacon Group walked through one additional door. It was the door of unity within our group. We experienced bonds and friendships that will be valued and cherished forever. Everyone in the group shared and lived as a Diaconate family. It was a joy to share ministry stories and parish duties. Wives shared their experiences with the future Deacon's wife. The laughter, tears, support, life experiences, and joy were immeasurable.

St. Stephen Fund

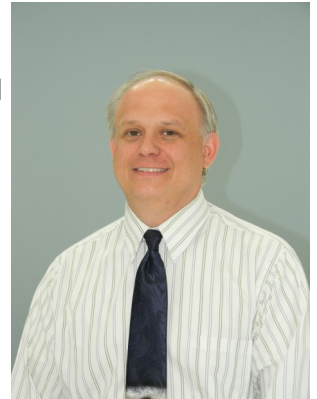




CRS Global Fellows

While I was in formation preparing for Confirmation, I participated in an event called a 30-Hour Famine. On a Friday, we began a fast at noon and agreed not to eat again until dinner time on Saturday. We met at our parish Friday evening for a youth lock-in to spend the hours of that fast together. While we were there, our formation director led us in growing in awareness and compassion for others who live in parts of the world acutely affected by famine and other situations that lead to hunger and deprivation.



That was where I first learned about Catholic Relief Service (CRS). We read and watched videos that exposed us to the lives and experiences of children and families in parts of the world we had never thought about before. All of this culminated in learning about how our outreach can make a difference in their lives and one of the most direct ways was by supporting CRS. Their work has been vital in sustaining communities through famines, hurricanes, earthquakes, and other natural and human caused difficulties. Begun in the 1940's by Catholic Bishops in the U.S. as a way to help World War II survivors and refugees, CRS has become an eminent relief agency inspired by the Gospel to cherish, preserve and uphold the sacredness and dignity of all human life, foster charity and justice, and embody Catholic social and moral teaching.

That Lent (which began a few weeks after the 30-Hour Famine event), our Confirmation group led the Operation Rice Bowl campaign at our parish. CRS' signature event, which is celebrating its 50th Anniversary this year, has raised millions of dollars that are very efficiently used to directly address human suffering around the world.

After I was ordained, I applied and was accepted as a CRS Global Fellow so that I can do more to contribute to their ministry than collecting change- I want to help make change. I chose to participate in this ministry because I want to help others live out our faith and the Call from the Gospels through active participation in prayer, outreach, and advocacy. Little did I know when I applied to the program last Fall that I would be joining at a time where it has never been more important for people of good will to be engaged in their commitment to serving vulnerable communities overseas than it is right now. The current disruptions to funding, the loss of jobs, and the closing of clinics and resource centers in impoverished communities is a dire threat to the lives of millions. I know that as an individual, I have very little power to effect the change that is needed to alleviate suffering in the world; I also know that the Body of Christ, present IN and AS the Church, has enormous capacity to do just that!

CRS has 75 years of experience in this area, so for me it was an easy choice to become a Global Fellow. I hope that I can be a means through which others can learn about Catholic Social Justice and get connected to effective avenues for enacting those principles. Wildfires generally end when they burn themselves out because they have no new fuel to ignite and spread, so I am hoping that my time and energy can be fuel to keep the fire of compassion and human development burning brightly. Call me if you want to talk more about it :)



The Tribunal Ministry in the Archdiocese of Santa Fe

As permanent deacons and most often husbands and fathers, a great deal of your ministry will not be just sacramental but will involve working with couples: those who want to marry and those who are married. In some ways, you understand the sacrament of matrimony in ways that many of the Church's presbyters do not. This will be important in your ministry to the people of the parishes to which you are assigned. People will be drawn to you and your ministry because they will be reluctant to approach their pastors for a variety of reasons.

Some of those approaching you will be those who are divorced and remarried. In your parents' and grandparents' young adulthood, divorce and remarriage were culturally the exception to the norm. Today, however, divorce and remarriage are not only acceptable but in some ways normal and expected. Religious practices, beliefs, and moral values which guided the behavior of many of the "boomers" and their parents do not have as much value to the generations of your children and grandchildren. Many of your children's and grandchildren's generations are "nones" (when asked what religion they have, they respond "None"), or they are agnostic at best (the root of the word *agnostic* means to know, and *agnostic* means unknown or skeptical). As they discover faith and respond to it, they find that they need help in ways they never expected, particularly if they are in subsequent more stable and long-term relationships which prevent them from participating fully in the life to which they now feel called.



As permanent deacons, those in such situations will come to you to find out what they must do to celebrate their current marriages and participate in the full life of the Church. This is proof of a true conversion, even if they are not able to express it as such. They are responding to Jesus' invitation to "follow me". As I am certain it was for the apostles, it is not as easy as the Gospels might lead one to believe. They can't simply leave their fishing boats or the tax table or the zealot party behind and follow Jesus.

To be active members of the faithful, their previous marriages have to be examined. Marriage is not private and has never been a private relationship, as intimate as it may be. It has always been external and public. Even before there was written law, the sexual relationship between a man and a woman has been exclusive, perpetual, and open to children, which are three of the four goods of marriage. As Genesis and the Gospels state, the two become one flesh. The Church, which wants to protect and respect such a "God given" relationship must determine who is married to whom, i.e., it must determine what God has joined together and what man has put asunder. Because marriage is a public matter, it has never been enough for civil law to determine this for those who are Catholic.

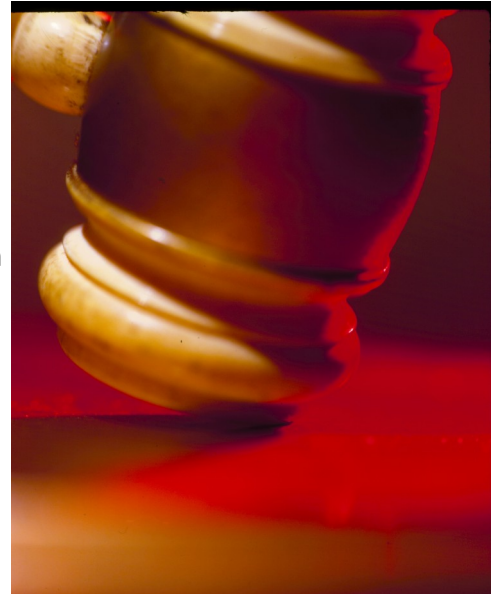


The tribunal is the judicial branch of the Church. Its job is to apply the law when asked, particularly in situations where Catholics need answers to questions that are not easily answered. The bulk of the work of the tribunal is the determination of the validity of a marital relationship. However, those who are trained in this area of law, are few. In the past, this area of study has been primarily the area of ordained presbyters. Since the new Code of Canon Law was approved in 1983, this area of study is open to not just presbyters, but to deacons and the laity as well.

The Tribunal of the Archdiocese of Santa Fe needs your help. We would love to have permanent deacons who hold canon law degrees, but we understand that many of you are older and have long been away from collegiate level studies. If you would like to pursue studies in canon law, please contact the tribunal. If, however, you would like to help, we need people who can act as advocates for those involved in cases before the tribunal, or those who are willing to study cases and offer advice to a judge (assessors). These two

“offices” of the tribunal do not require a degree in canon law. If you have training in psychology and civil law, particularly regarding “divorce”, we would like to have your help. But even if you do not have training in those areas of study, your experience of marriage can assist a judge. Those who are judges in the tribunal will train you in the specific area of canon law related to the sacrament of matrimony so that you can be effective in guiding those involved in cases or in offering advice to a judge.

Looking back on such a failed, very intimate, and personal relationship of a marriage that ended in divorce can be very upsetting for some, particularly remembering the pain and suffering that was experienced. Your compassion and assistance in that area is a way that you, as a Catholic and a married person, support those who have been married. It is also a way that you assist someone trying to return to the Lord. It is a ministry that is unsung, and often unrealized by many in the Church because it is so intimate and confidential. It is nevertheless invaluable to those who make this difficult journey of conversion. It is a ministry of compassion. Although the corporal and spiritual works of mercy do not list “assisting the divorced and remarried”, it is certainly “comfort the sorrowful” or “counsel the doubtful”.



Among the many challenges and possible ministries you consider as a permanent deacon, please consider the ministry of assisting in the work of the tribunal.
